Trees

Birch – 2 gallon, \$8 (check at Lowes where a 3.5 gallon sells for \$44)

Cedar of Lebanon (Cedrus) – 5 gallon, \$5

Dawn Redwood – very unusual this one is deciduous, **5 gallon, \$10**

Japanese Maples – 1 or 2 gallon, \$12 to \$15 (these sell for more than double at other locations including Willowside School)

Pittosporum – 2 gallon, \$6 (online 1 gallon is \$17)

Snowball Tree (viburnum) – small tree, 1 gallon, \$6

Washington Hawthorn – **really nice not too big tree, 1 gallon, \$7.50**

Mystery trees – we can't tell, maybe you know what they are...make an offer

Large Shrubs

Abutilon – The Wow Power of Flowering Maple: This is an amazing evergreen: it blooms like crazy most of the year. Easy care, it can be trained into a hedge or single plant (even in a large pot).

The dazzling good looks of abutilon are impossible to ignore. Stand by the display in the garden store and listen for the oohs and aahs. What's the big deal? Well, just about every part of this flowering plant is enchanting. The stems are slender and upright, and the gracefully arching branches bear broad, soft-textured leaves lobed like maple leaves. That's why abutilon is called flowering maple, although it is completely unrelated to the maple clan. The charm of the leaves alone would make flowering maple a coveted foliage plant, but then there are those enchanting flowers.

You know that crepe-paper texture that is one of the wonders of [hibiscus](#), mallow, and Oriental poppies? Flowering maple blossoms are just as delicate and papery but hang downward like little paper lanterns. They come in the same orange-yellow of California poppies, but cultivars offer many other hues, from bright yellow to lilac to gorgeous tiger blossoms.

And the best part: the flowers just keep rolling in, wave after wave of blossoms from spring through fall. In warmer regions, abutilon flower profusely all year.

Amazon sells abutilons in 4" pots up to \$45 each.

Spiky New Zealand Flax (Phormium) – several varieties, 2 to 5 gallon, \$4 to \$10



Gardeners grow New Zealand Flax as a large and often colorful, spiky plant that makes an arresting [focal point](#) in the garden or in containers. It has sword-like leaves that shoot up from the base of the plant. New hybrids are now available in bright shades of yellow, pink, red and bronze.

These blade-leaved, evergreen perennials are often used as specimen plants. Some are small enough to use in containers, others can reach several feet in diameter and grow to over 7 feet tall. On mature plants, the flower stalks shoot up above the leaves and produce curving, tubular red or yellow blossoms that are very high in nectar and a [hummingbird favorite](#). Seed pods form after the flowers bloom.

Phormium got the name New Zealand Flax because the Maoris of New Zealand actually used it for making a type of linen clothing, similar to flax, as well as for ropes and baskets.

Aeonium – various colors, sizes & prices

Arctostaphylos ‘Carmel’ – 1 gallon, \$3.50 or 2 gallon, \$5

Heuchera Maxima – 1 gallon, \$3.50. The large 3" to 5" dark green leaves and spikes of small pinkish flowers make it appear very **delicate** but it's surprisingly **drought resistant** (they do well in **shade**)

Honeysuckle (Ionicera) – 1 gallon, \$6.50 in a nice decorative pot

Hydrangeas – 4” pot, \$2.50 (online = \$9.95 for 1 qt size or \$43 for 2 1-gallon)

Ivy (variegated) – 1 gallon, \$3.50

Jade Plants (crassula) – various sizes from \$2 to \$5

Penstemon (Firecracker) – 1 gallon or larger, \$3.50

Primrose (Helianthemum ‘Wisely’) – 1 gallon, \$4; various colors, 6” pot, \$3

Roses – 1 climber, 5 gallon (color unknown) \$4; beautiful 1 gallon, \$4, with bright pink/peach colored flowers

Rubus – 1 gallon, \$4

Spekbloom (Portulacaria variegata) – from Africa, 1 gallon, \$4
